



Population Distribution by Age Washington Region

Percent Change in Population Aged 25-34 15 Largest Metros, 2014 - 2016






Job Change in the Washington Region 2000 – 2017 (in thousands)


Growth Rates of the Washington Region's Advanced Industrial Clusters June 2014 to June 2017, Annualized Growth


Job Change in Loudoun County 2002 – 2016 (in thousands)


Professional & Business Services Job Change Loudoun County, 2002 – 2016 (in thousands)

Leisure & Hospitality Job Change Loudoun County, 2002 – 2016 (in thousands)






Job Change in the Washington Region 2007 – 2017 – 2022 (in thousands)




Private Sector, Traditional Office-Using Job Change Washington Region 2007 – 2017 – 2022 (in thousands)
